# The Third Sunday of Easter – Jubilate

Tradition designates this Third Sunday of Easter as **Jubilate Sunday**, from the Latin entrance chant for this day which begins with the words "Jubilate Deo, omnis terra!" "Be joyful in God, all you lands!" These are the first words of both Psalm 66 and Psalm 100.

In keeping with the spirit of this day of jubilation, several of our musical selections are inspired by the text of Psalm 100. Our **choral introit** is a youthful work by Mozart based on this text. Our **offering canticle** is the well-known *Old Hundredth Psalm Tune*, which is closely identified with William Kethe's psalm paraphrase,

"All the people that on earth do dwell, Sing to the Lord with cheerful voice! Him serve with fear, his praise forth tell; Come ye before him and rejoice."

On this **Jubilate Sunday**, the Church enjoins us to proclaim, with St. Augustine, that "we are an Easter people, and 'Alleluia' is our song!"

The gospel for the third Sunday of Easter is always one in which the risen Christ shares food with the disciples, meals that are the Easter template for the meal we share each Lord's day. In today's gospel, Jesus both shares the disciples' food and shows them the meaning of his suffering, death, and resurrection through the scriptures: the two main elements of our Sunday worship.

Before we commune today, we will sing "Be known to us, O Jesus, in the breaking of the bread" – praying confidently that Jesus will be known to us as he was once known to his disciples.

FIRST READING Acts 3:12-19

Health and forgiveness through the risen Jesus

After healing a man unable to walk, Peter preaches to the people how God's promises to Israel have been fulfilled in Jesus. Through the proclamation of Christ's death and resurrection, God is offering them forgiveness and restoration in Jesus' name.


A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made this man walk? The God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified Jesus, the servant of God, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though Pilate had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in the name of Jesus, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

"And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what had been foretold through all the prophets, that the Messiah of God would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

# SECOND READING 1 John 3:1-7

The revealing of the children of God

God has loved us in order to make us children of God. Though we do not yet know the full details of our future existence, we trust that God will reveal it just as God revealed Jesus to take away our sins.

A reading from the First Letter of John.

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know God. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when it is revealed, we will be like God, for we will see God as God is. And all who have this hope in God purify themselves, just as the Son is pure.

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness. You know that Christ was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in the Son sins; no one who sins has either seen or known the Son. Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as Christ is righteous.

## HOLY GOSPEL Luke 24:36b-48

#### Eating with the risen Christ

In this account of an appearance after his resurrection, Jesus opens the minds of the disciples to understand him as Messiah. Jesus convinces them that he has been raised and sends them on a mission to proclaim the message of repentance and forgiveness.

As the gospel is announced, a small cross may be traced with the thumb on the forehead, then on the lips, then on the breast, as a prayer that the gospel may dwell in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts.

The \(\pm\) holy gospel according to St. Luke, the twenty-fourth chapter.



Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then Jesus said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you – that everything written about me in the laws of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."





This morning's music includes selections by perhaps the most miraculously gifted of all composers, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791). The selections include works from Mozart's youth as well as from his later years. Nonetheless, these elegant pieces all exhibit the characteristic lyric grace and expressive charm typical of the Salzburg master, who is arguably the most famous (and, thanks to Hollywood, possibly the most misunderstood) of all composers.


