# **Cantate Sunday**

Cantate Domino canticum novum, Alleluia! Today is Cantate Sunday, the Fifth Sunday of Easter. The ancient entrance chant for this day began,

"Sing to the Lord a new song, Alleluia, for God has done marvelous deeds!

In the sight of the nations the Lord's justice is revealed."

This text, from Psalm 96, has inspired musicians throughout the ages to extol the wonders of a living God who is at once ancient, eternal, and ever new. We who have been baptized into the death of Christ have come to share in that divine newness of life. We see (and hear) in the renewal of springtime a striking expression of this new life. Indeed, our very lives are new canticles, and all earthly life a symphony of praise to the creator, for it is in this miracle of life that God's justice is revealed.





# WORD

God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching, and song

FIRST READING Acts 8:26-40

Philip teaches and baptizes an Ethiopian

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, he is baptized by Philip.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So Philip got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Philip asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" The eunuch replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus.

As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him.

When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

SECOND READING 1 John 4:7-21

God's love perfected in love for one another

We love God and others because God first loved us. We cannot say we love God, whom we have not seen, while hating others, whom we regularly see. Love toward God is to be matched by love toward others because the essence of God is love.

A reading from the First Letter of John.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent into the world God's only Son so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that God loved us and sent the Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and God's love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in God and God in us, because we have been given of God's own Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent the Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as the Son is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because God first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate a member of the community, are liars; for those who do not love a person whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from God is this: those who love God must love the members of the family also.

#### Christ the vine

Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned.

"If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."



Gluten-free wafers are available. If any need to commune under one element (only the bread or only the wine/juice), know that the fullness of the sacrament is present in the one element.

**Today's postlude**, likewise offering a new sound, is by the twentieth-century French composer, Jean Langlais, whose music explores striking new harmonies and melodic contours. Musicians often talk about harmonies in terms of "color," and there is a striking connection between the colors of modern French music, the blazing hues of stained-glass windows, what the French call, *vitraux*. Stained glass was not a French invention, but it was the French achievement in Gothic architecture that gave these 'singing windows' their profoundly spiritual power. The music of Jean Langlais might well be understood in these colorful terms.

# Cantate – Sing to the Lord a new song

Many of today's hymns are *new songs*, perhaps not brand new, but nonetheless representative of our own times.

Our **service order** [*Iron Mountain Mass*] is the work of contemporary composer Robert Hawthorne, who is today very active in the Episcopal Church in Portland, Oregon.

Our **Hymn of the Day** is a recently composed text, by the late Minnesota poet and hymnist, Susan Palo Cherwien (1953-2021). The words, especially pertinent to today's Gospel lesson of the vine and branches, are sung to a venerable Scottish tune (O WALY WALY), for which the author originally intended these inspired lyrics.

The **Communion Hymn** [#374] is another recent hymn by Susan Cherwien, sung to a melody by well-known Lutheran composer, Carl Schalk. (Incidentally, Carl Schalk is a former organist of Bethel; Susan Cherwien was the wife of David Cherwien, director of the National Lutheran Choir.)

Our **Sending Hymn** [# 449], by the British composer Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924), rejoices in our new life in baptism to words by the contemporary author, John Geyer.

**Today's organ selections**, likewise offering a new sound, are by the twentieth-century French composer, **Jean Langlais** (1907-1991). This music explores striking new harmonies and melodic contours.

One of the glorious gifts of creation is the song of birds, especially in the springtime. There is nothing "novel" about this, yet how fresh it sounds after the gloom of winter! So too, our feeble human attempts to recreate God's beautiful music can refresh and renew us. In this sense, good music done well becomes a new canticle to the Lord.


