

Seventh Sunday of Easter: Exaudi Sunday

Exaudi, Domine, vocem meam, qua clamavi ad te. Tibi dixit cor meam, quaesivi vultum tuum, vultum tuum, Domine, requiram: ne avertas faciem tuam a me.


Hear my voice, O Lord, when I cry to you! To you my heart speaks; your glance I seek; your presence, O Lord, I seek. Hide not your face from me. [Psalm 27:10-12]

Today, the Sunday after the Ascension, is a pivotal day in the Church Year. We find a hint of its significance in the Ascension account in the Acts of the Apostles, in which an angel appears to inquire, "O Galileans, why do you stand there looking up into the skies? This Jesus who has been taken from you will return, just as you saw him go up into the heavens." What a striking image! We can easily imagine the Apostles milling around, gazing heavenward, their mouths agape. Likewise for us, this is a time whose liturgical meaning and message lack closure.

Our music takes up the theme for this day, when we stand balanced, as it were, between Christ's ascension into heaven, and his sending of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. The hymns and choral anthems *look back* to Christ's rising to new life, and ascending to glory with God the Father. But, our music also *looks ahead* to the establishing of Christ's realm through the life-giving power of the Spirit. In the meantime, we remain earthbound, like the Apostles, earnestly, prayerfully, expectantly seeking the face of our Savior.

Bethel Chancel Window: The Ascension of Christ

Note today our chancel stained-glass window, which was installed in 1934. In the center panel is the Ascending Christ with the apostles grouped about him. At the top of the center panel, a Hand (cf. 1 Peter 5:6: "the mighty hand of God") protrudes through the clouds, symbolizing the power of the Sovereign God. In the blue background below the Hand are red letters Alpha (**A**) and Omega (Ω), the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, indicating that Christ is the beginning and the end of all things.

The left- and right-hand panels represent the Old and New Testaments pointing to the Ascension and Exaltation of Christ.

The left-hand panel features David, to whom authorship of many Psalms has been attributed. Psalm 47 is the Psalm used for the Ascension: "God has gone up with a shout, the LORD with the sound of the ram's horn." [Psalm 47:5] At the top of that panel is the Ark of the Covenant, a symbol of the Old Testament.

The right-hand panel features St. John the Divine, because of his description of the Exalted Christ in the first chapter of the Book of Revelation: "Look, he is coming with the clouds. / I saw one like the Son-of-Man, clothed with a long robe." [Revelation 1:7, 13] At the top of that panel is a Chalice, a symbol of the New Testament.

The responses of the assembly appear in **bold** type. "ELW" refers to Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the cranberry-colored book in the pew racks. Standing and sitting are corporate acts of the assembly. When the assembly stands, those who are able stand on behalf of those who cannot.

The gospel for Easter's seventh Sunday is always taken from the long prayer Jesus prays for his followers in John's gospel on the night before his death, and always includes Jesus' desire that his followers will be one as he and the Father are one. This oneness is not mere doctrinal agreement or institutional unity, but mutual abiding, interpenetrating life, mutual love, and joy. This oneness is the work of the Spirit whom we have received but also await. Come, Holy Spirit!

FIRST READING

Acts 1:15-17, 21-26

Matthias added to the apostles

In the days between Jesus' ascension and Pentecost, Peter oversees the process whereby one of the members of the community of believers is chosen to be the twelfth apostle, in order to fill the vacancy created by Judas's treachery and death.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus, for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry.

"So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when Jesus was taken up from us one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection." So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, "Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was added to the eleven apostles.

SECOND READING

Life in the Son of God

God has borne witness to the gift of eternal life in Jesus Christ. Whoever believes in the Son of God believes in the witness of God and has the promise of eternal life.

A reading from the First Letter of John.

If we receive human testimony, the testimony of God is greater, for this is the testimony of God that God has testified to the Son. Those who believe in the Son of God have the testimony in their hearts. Those who do not believe in God have made God a liar by not believing in the testimony that God has given concerning the Son. And this is the testimony: God gave us eternal life, and this life is in the Son of God. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life.

I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.**

HOLY GOSPEL

Christ's prayer for his disciples

In this reading the church hears Jesus' words on the night before his death—his prayer for his disciples and for all who would believe in him through their words.


As the gospel is announced, a small cross may be traced with the thumb on the forehead, then on the lips, then on the breast, as a prayer that the gospel may dwell in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts.

The + holy gospel according to St. John, the seventeenth chapter.



[Jesus prayed:] "I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you.

"Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one. While I was with them, I protected them in your name that you have given me, I guarded them, and not one of them was lost except the one destined to be lost, so that the scripture might be fulfilled. But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves. I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one. They do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, so that they also may be sanctified in truth."



NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. 


THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

THANKSGIVING AT THE TABLE

Blessed are you, O God of the universe. Your mercy is everlasting and your faithfulness endures from age to age.

Praise to you for creating the heavens and the earth. Praise to you for saving the earth from the waters of the flood. Praise to you for bringing the Israelites safely through the sea. Praise to you for leading your people through the wilderness to the land of milk and honey. Praise to you for the words and deeds of Jesus, your anointed one. Gluten-free wafers are available. If any need to commune under one element (only the bread or only the wine/juice), know that the fullness of the sacrament is present in the one element.

Today's instrumental music includes selections from Sebastian Bach's fourth *French Suite*, BWV 815. Each of Bach's suites is a series of stylized French dances, all in a single key. These dances are not mere entertainments; indeed, French dance forms influenced all serious music in the eighteenth century. To take but one celebrated example, the finale to Bach's *Saint Matthew Passion* is a great threnody to the buried Christ, cast in the form of a solemn *sarabande*.




