James tells us to stop showing favoritism in the assembly, treating the rich visitor with more honor than the poor one. Jesus himself seems to show partiality in his first response to the Syrophoenician woman in today's gospel. Was he testing her faith in saying Gentiles don't deserve the goods meant for God's children? Or was he speaking out of his human worldview, but transcended those limits when she took him by surprise with her reply? Either way, the story tells us that God shows no partiality. Everyone who brings their need to Jesus is received with equal honor as a child and heir.





FIRST READING Isaiah 35:4-7a

Like streams in the desert, God comes with healing

These verses are a word of hope to the exiles in Babylon. Chapter 34 portrays God's vengeance on Edom, Israel's age-old enemy, which makes the path from Babylon to Zion safe for the exiles' return. The desert itself will flow with water to give drink to the returning exiles.

A reading from Isaiah.

Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. Your God will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. God will come and save you."

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf shall be opened; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool and the thirsty ground springs of water.

Faith without works is dead

Faithful Christians do not show partiality to the rich and powerful of the world, especially at the expense of the poor and weak. Likewise, faith does not pay mere lip-service to God's will. Instead, a living Christian faith expresses itself in acts of compassion and mercy for those in need.

A reading from James.

My dear family, do not claim the faith of our Lord Jesus Christ of glory while showing partiality. For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here in a good place, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit by my footstool," have you not made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved ones. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the dominion promised to those who love God? But you have dishonored the poor person. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into the courts? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

If you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself," you do well. But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. So speak and so act as those who are judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment.

What good is it, my dear family, if someone claims to have faith but does not have works? Surely that faith cannot save, can it? If one of your siblings is naked and lacks daily food and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.






HOLY GOSPEL Mark 7:24-37

Christ healing a little girl and a deaf man

In Mark's gospel, encounters with women usually signify turning points in Jesus' ministry. Here, a conversation with a Syrophoenician woman marks the beginning of his mission to the Gentiles.


The # holy gospel according to Mark, the seventh chapter.



Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. Jesus said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then Jesus said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." And when she went home, she found the child lying on the bed and the demon gone.

Then Jesus returned from the region of Tyre and went by way of Sidon toward the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech, and they begged him to lay his hand on him. Jesus took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, Jesus sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one, but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

With this bread and cup we remember your Son, the first-born of your new creation. We remember his life lived for others, and his death and resurrection, which renews the face of the earth.


We await his coming, when, with the world made perfect through your wisdom, all our sins and sorrows will be no more.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION AND BREAKING OF THE BREAD


The presiding minister invites the assembly to Christ's table, where all are welcome.

POSTLUDE from the Notebook for Anna Magdalena Bach [1725]

March in D major

Carl Philipp Emmanuel Bach (1714-1788)

* * *

Instrumental music for this service is from the celebrated *Noten-Büchlein vor Anna Magdalena Bach*. This diverse compilation of keyboard pieces, dance movements, chorales, and arias, was a kind of musical scrapbook – of the most elegant type. Anna Magdalena was Sebastian Bach's second wife, whom he married in 1721, about a year and a half after the death of his first wife. The handsomely bound, blank *Notebook*, possibly a birthday gift to Anna Magdalena, was inscribed to her in 1725. It became filled with music by many Baroque composers, only a few selections of which are certifiably by Bach himself. As with most practical music in those days, the notation was all handwritten, by various members of the Bach household: Johann Sebastian, sons Wilhelm Friedemann and Carl Philipp Emanuel, and of course, Anna Magdalena, who wrote with a very graceful hand. This collection provides an intimate glimpse into the *Hausmusik* – the recreational household music – of the Bach family.

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY September 15, 2024 – Lectionary 24 The Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost The Third Sunday of the Season of Creation

On August 25 we heard Peter's confession of faith as told in John's gospel. On September 15 we hear Mark's version, when Peter says, "You are the Messiah." In John, the stumbling block is Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh, given for the life of the world. In Mark too the scandal has to do with Jesus' words about his own coming death, and here Peter himself stumbles over Jesus' words. But Jesus is anointed (the meaning of *messiah*) in Mark only on the way to the cross (14:3); so we are anointed in baptism with the sign of the cross.

James 3:1-12	Dangers of the unbridled tongue
Mark 8:27-38	Peter's confession of faith




